All Quiet on the Western Front - Erich Maria Remarque (Historical Fiction)

This is the testament of Paul Bäumer, who enlists with his classmates in the German army during World War I. They become soldiers with youthful enthusiasm. But the world of duty, culture, and progress they had been taught breaks in pieces under the first bombardment in the trenches.

Black Birds in the Sky: The Story and Legacy of the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre - Colbert (Nonfiction, History)

How Do You Live? - Yoshino (Fiction, Translation)

After the death of his father, fifteen-year-old Copper must confront inevitable and enormous change, including the aftermath of his own betrayal of his best friend. Between episodes of Copper's emerging story, letters from his uncle share knowledge and offer advice on life's big questions. Like his namesake Copernicus, Copper looks to the stars and uses his discoveries about the heavens, earth, and human nature to answer the question of how he will live.

Love in English - Andreu (Modern Fiction)

When Ana immigrates to New Jersey from Argentina at sixteen, she has to grapple with a new country, new school, changed family dynamics, and two very different boys, all in a language in which she hasn't achieved fluency.

Miles Morales: Spider-Man (A Marvel YA Novel) - Reynolds (Fiction, Graphic Novel)

Miles Morales is just your average teenager. Dinner every Sunday with his parents, chilling out playing old-school video games with his best friend, Ganke, crushing on brainy, beautiful poet Alicia. He's even got a scholarship spot at the prestigious Brooklyn Visions Academy. Oh yeah, and he's Spider-Man.

Rez Ball - Graves (Fiction, Sports)

When Jaxon's former teammates on the varsity team offer to take Tre under their wing, he sees this as his shot to represent his Ojibwe rez all the way to their first state championship. Shoe Dog - Knight (Memoir, Nonfiction, Sports, Business)
