IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Attendance - School Absences and Early Dismissals

Parents must email the Summer Programs Office at summerprograms@notredamehs.com no later than 8:00 AM. The email must come from the parent/guardian. Please include the following information:

- Student's first and last name
- Date of the absence or early dismissal
- Reason for the absence or early dismissal

Additionally, parents or guardians are required to present a valid form of identification upon arrival to pick up their student.

Drop-off and Pick-up

Drop-off and pick-up will be at the main entrance of the school.



Lunch and Snack

Students enrolled in Notre Dame's Summer Programs will receive a snack during the morning break at 10:00 AM. Lunch will be provided at 11:30 AM and will conclude at noon. Both are included in the registration fee. A water bottle is recommended. Meals for students with dietary restrictions, as indicated on their registration forms, will be prepared and available at lunch.

Dismissal

Students must be picked up promptly at 12:00 PM, as no supervision will be provided after that time.

What to Wear and What to Bring

What to wear:

- T-shirt and shorts with sneakers (no flip-flops or Crocs)
- Clothing must not have slogans, words, or pictures promoting or depicting violence, profanity, racism, alcohol, drugs, or have sexual connotations.

What to bring:

- A water bottle
- Materials requested by the teacher

Behavior and the Notre Dame Code

Students enrolled in the Notre Dame High School Summer Programs are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that allows each student to benefit from a positive learning environment. It is to be understood that a student is responsible for their actions and decisions. All students should abide by the following:

- Not harm or endanger themselves or other participants or staff
- Use respectful language towards all peers and staff
- Respect supplies, equipment, and facilities
- Leave inappropriate items at home

Classroom teachers will be given discretion to handle disciplinary issues that arise within their classroom. Any student not in compliance will be referred to the Director of Summer Programs. Further disciplinary action may be taken at that time, including being asked to leave Summer Programs without any refund of tuition paid.

Notre Dame students are responsible for their actions off-campus and during non-school hours and could be subject to disciplinary action for various violations. At any school function or any activity in which a student participates as a Notre Dame student, the student will be subject to school regulations. It is important to note that negative behavior, whether inside or outside the school, that is detrimental to the school's reputation, can result in disciplinary action against the student. These actions may result in the student being asked to withdraw or being dismissed from Notre Dame High School's Summer Program.



Medication and Medical Needs

A school nurse will not be on campus over the summer. The Director of Summer Programs, Mr. Ruben Valencia, will keep all medications in a locked cabinet.

- Medical issues requiring medication and/or supervision by a health care professional must be reported to the Director of Summer Programs.
- A Medical Authorization form must be completed and turned in to the Director of Summer Programs.
- Connecticut State Law requires that no medication, prescription, or non-prescription medication be taken by or given to any student unless ordered, in writing, by a physician. Such an order must be signed by both the parent/guardian and the physician and must be on file at school.
- Students who require a doctor's prescription for EpiPens and inhalers must carry them at all times.

ACCIDENTS

- If a participant is involved in an accident, an incident form will be completed, and the parent or guardian will be contacted by phone or email. In the event of an emergency, parents or guardians will be notified immediately, and an ambulance will be called to transport the student to the nearest hospital.

Emergency and Evacuation

Should a schoolwide emergency occur, students will be directed to the appropriate location on our campus as directed by Notre Dame Faculty and Administration.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

Academic Integrity

Notre Dame takes academic integrity very seriously. Academic dishonesty is defined as behavior that results in, or may result in, the student or any other student gaining an unfair advantage in one or more assessment components. The Director of Summer Programs will deal with cases of academic dishonesty. Multiple incidences of academic dishonesty may result in a student being asked to leave Summer Programs.

Homework

Teachers may assign homework as an extension of learning or for practice. Students are required to complete assignments by the next day or by the teacher's stated due date.



Technology

Chromebooks:

- Only school-issued Chromebooks may be used in class and only for classwork. Their use to access outside and/or inappropriate content will result in their confiscation by the Director of Summer Programs.
 - Students who have a Notre Dame-issued Chromebook may continue to use it during Summer Programs.
 - Non-ND students and newly accepted ND students who do not have a Notre Dame-issued Chromebook will have access to one during their class time. These devices should remain in the classroom during the entire Summer Programs and cannot be taken home.

Desktop Computers:

- Desktop Computers are solely for classroom use. Students may not download or use unauthorized software, or make unapproved changes to the computer's background picture or settings.

Cell Phones:

- All cell phones must be caddied at the beginning of class and cannot be removed without permission. They should not be taken to the bathroom or anywhere outside the classroom. Pictures and videos cannot be taken in classrooms without the teacher's permission. Failure to follow these rules will result in the Director of Summer Programs confiscating your cell phone.

AirPods and Personal Headphones:

- AirPods and student headphones are not allowed in classrooms unless the teacher gives specific permission to use them.

Artificial Intelligence (AI):

- Students may not use AI platforms to produce work for submission. Such unoriginal uses of AI will be treated like cheating. There may be instances when using such platforms is allowed in class, but only under supervision.

End-of-Course Certificates and Reports

Certificates:

- Students who successfully complete a summer program course will receive an End-of-Course Certificate from their teacher on the last day of the course.

End-of-Course Reports:

- Upon conclusion of a summer course, students will receive an End-of-Course Report by email from their teacher indicating the achievement level attained during the course. A description of each achievement level is provided in the table below.



End-of-Course achievement levels and descriptions.

Achievement Level	Description
Exemplary	Demonstrates outstanding understanding, engagement, and initiative. Consistently exceeds expectations in all assignments, participation, and conduct.
Proficient	Meets expectations with solid understanding and consistent participation. Completes all tasks and demonstrates dependable academic performance.
Developing	Shows partial understanding and inconsistent participation. Some tasks are incomplete or lack depth; they need occasional guidance to stay on track.
Emerging	Struggles to meet expectations. Limited participation or comprehension; requires frequent support and improvement in engagement and work completion.



12:00 noon	Dismissal <i>Those students enrolled in the Green Knight Sports Camp would move to the Gymnasium at this time.</i>


*The Accelerated Math (5-week program) and Algebra 2 Readiness (2-week program) courses will run from 12:00 PM to 3:00 PM.




SCHOOL MAP
